Worship Assistants Needed as We Resume Our Life Together in Worship

The Trinity congregation has resumed offering Holy Communion with fresh bread and wine since early July. Many have expressed their appreciation for the return to our Holy Communion practice. **To properly offer Holy Communion at Trinity, we need those who are willing to be back in worship to step up and assist us. We need:**

•**Bread Bakers:** Those who prepare fresh bread for Communion, generally for one month at a time – we could use three new bakers to join our team for the year ahead.

•**Sacristans:** Those who serve on a rotation to prepare the communion vessels with bread and wine for worship, and then clean up after worship, generally serving for just the worship service they normally attend – we hope to have enough sacristans that you would only serve once every six to eight weeks.

•**Communion Assistants:** Those who serve on a rotation to offer the wine as the pastors offer the bread during distribution of Holy Communion, generally serving at the worship service they normally attend.

•**Lectors:** Those who read the lessons from scripture and the Prayers of Intercession during worship.

•**Ushers and Greeters:** Those who welcome worshippers and assist them with worship materials and the movement forward to receive Holy Communion.

Particularly in this time when some of our members are not yet planning to return to worship and resume their way of serving, new volunteers are needed. The offering of wine in Holy Communion will be dependent on enough volunteers offering to serve! Contact the church office or one of the pastors for more information.

The final two “First Sunday” Outdoor Worship gatherings of 2021 will be offered on Sunday, September 5 and Sunday, October 3, with the annual **Blessing of the Animals** offered at the October 3 service. The outdoor service will be located on the west lawn under the Cross Tower at 10:45 a.m., allowing those who wish to worship indoors that day to gather at 8 a.m. for Traditional worship or at 9:15 a.m. for Rejoice worship with live streaming.

All are welcome to join us in celebration for outdoor worship in 2021 – mark your calendar for the September and October outdoor worship gatherings and know that in case of inclement weather we will reschedule on the second Sunday of the month.

A Message from Pastor Bob Linstrom



Remembering a Life Well Lived

In the spring of 2013, my father preached at my installation as the new Senior Pastor at Trinity Lutheran Church in Grand Rapids. I had petitioned Bishop Schleicher to invite him to preach, as he had at my ordination nearly 30 years before.

My father died on July 30 after about two months of steadily declining health and hospitalizations. His passing was peaceful with hospice staff and family gathered at his bedside at home. My former bishop, upon learning of my father's death, sent words of consolation last week, along with memories of that Installation Day sermon more than eight years ago. My father had initiated that sermon intoning the familiar Pauline salutation. "Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ," he began. Dad continued, "Well," he said, "I understand that you have called Pastor Bob Linstrom to be your new Senior Pastor. Congratulations. But you need to know that I am the real Pastor Bob Linstrom . . ." he deadpanned. And he had his audience.

That Installation Day celebration remains a good memory for me. Bishop Schleicher recalled my father's "little raillery," a bit of gentle teasing as he intimated that I was not quite on par with his pastoral skills. Yet, without him quite saying it, I knew that he was honored that I had asked him to preach that day, and that he was pleased with my new call to ministry among the people of Trinity Lutheran Church.

We had a wonderful celebration of his nearly 94-year-old life on July 7, remembering his 55 years of marriage to my mother who predeceased him, his 66 years of ordained ministry as a pastor, the congregations and synod leadership positions he served, his honorary doctorate from Wittenberg University, his service in the Army Air Corps in the closing year of World War II, and his generations of children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. All four of his sons offered words of remembrance, his daughters-in-law read the scripture, and his grandchildren served as crucifer, torch bearers, ushers, and pallbearers. A full church gathered in thanksgiving for a life well lived.

I began sharing with church staff and others a prayer that has particular meaning for me in the weeks before my Dad died. Many of you have prayed it with me, a prayer from our sisters and brothers in the Anglican communion:

*O Lord, support us all the day long of this troubled life,
until the shadows lengthen and the evening comes
and the busy world is hushed, the fever of life is over,
and our work is done.*

*Then, in your mercy, grant us a safe lodging,
and a holy rest, and peace at the last,
through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.*

Many of you have sent good wishes and prayers my way in recent weeks. Thank you. It remains a privilege to be a pastor among you, even if I am not the real Pastor Bob Linstrom . . .

A Message from Treasurer & Finance Committee Member Chris Engle

Well, I can't believe I am writing an article for September already. Our Michigan summers are wonderful, but they move so fast. As I write this, I remain hopeful that we continue to move toward a post-pandemic level of worship, mission, and social activity.

It has been almost two years since I last wrote a Messenger article and it has been a challenging two years to say the least. I am reminded of our promise of restoration and hope in Christ as conveyed in 1 Peter 5:10: *"And the God of grace, who called you to his eternal glory in Christ, after you have suffered a little while, will himself restore you and make you strong, firm, and steadfast."* Have we grown stronger through these challenges?

Through your generous giving, the financial position of our congregation has strengthened:

- We have retired over \$500,000 of our mortgage in two years which puts us very close to being on pace to fully pay off the mortgage in the original 7-year period.
- Our Building Endowment Fund has tripled in value to \$662,184.
- Our Mission Endowment Fund has grown by 54% to \$840,760
- We now have \$397,024 in operating and capital reserves.

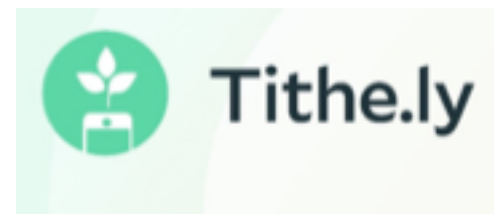
Staff and committees have done a great job of managing expenses during this timeframe. That being said, we have invested in upgrades to our audio/visual technology and security technology. We have learned new ways to meet and worship that prepare us for the challenges of the future. One thing is for certain: there will be more challenges in the future, but our efforts and faith will make us stronger.

To continue to meet these challenges, I will remind you of some giving opportunities that may be helpful as we finish the year. Gifts of appreciated stock, mutual funds, or other highly appreciated assets can be a very tax efficient method of giving. Also, a Qualified Charitable Distribution from an IRA has become very popular. Consult your financial or tax professional to see if these would be worthwhile for your situation.

A Message from Associate Pastor Dan Schewe

1 Now the LORD said to Abram, "Go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the land that I will show you. 2 I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you, and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing. 3 I will bless those who bless you, and the one who curses you I will curse; and in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed." –Genesis 12:1-3

This September, we seek to reengage our ministries in ways we have not for over a year. The pandemic we continue to walk through has forced us into new and different rhythms. It has forced us down paths we never saw coming. We have learned many things that will be carried with us into the future, and we all have been changed by this experience.

As we prepare to start this season of ministry, I find it helpful to return to one of the cornerstone passages of our faith. In Genesis 12, God tells Abram (who is eventually Abraham) to leave his homeland and go to where God is showing him. I'm sure Abram had some anxiety about this, as do many of us in these days.

God sends Abram with a two-fold blessing.

First, God promises to bless Abram. God promises to make him into a great nation, to be greatly known, and to bless those who bless him and curse those who curse him. God promises to pour into Abram's life and he will blossom into something wonderful.

Second, God promises Abram that he will be a blessing to all those around him. Abram is blessed to be a blessing. He is blessed by God so that God's love and promise can flow through him into all the peoples of the earth.

This passage is also for us. God is calling us to go, to do, to travel down paths we do not know, to follow where God is calling. Often into scary, unknown places.

We, too, receive this two-fold blessing. God promises to bless us in so many ways, and shows us that these blessings are not simply for us, but for everyone. We are blessed to be a blessing.

Remember that every day. You are blessed, and you are blessed to be a blessing.

Tuesday Morning Women's Bible Study



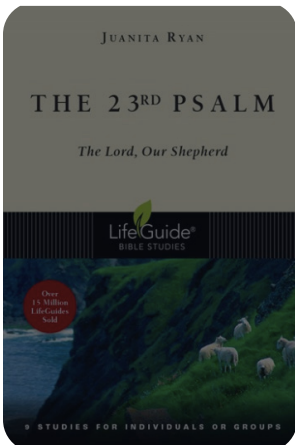
Meets weekly starting Tuesday, September 7 at 9:30 a.m.

Pastor Bob's Wednesday Adult Forum for the Fall of 2021

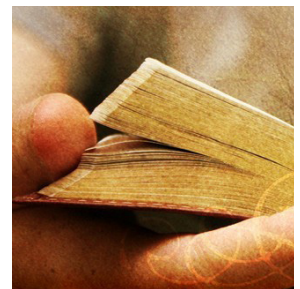

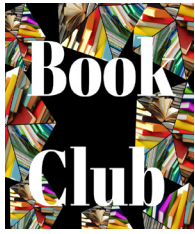
- **September 15 – From Night to Dawn**

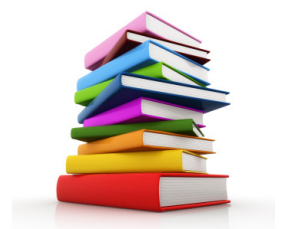

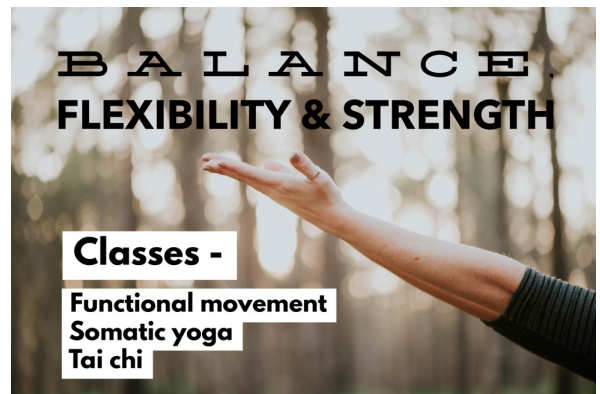

The Founding of Our Congregation

In celebration of Trinity's 125th anniversary in 2021, the following is excerpted from Christian Carron's 100th anniversary history of Trinity Lutheran Church, citing the emergence of German and Swedish speaking Lutheran congregations in Grand Rapids of the 1800's, but opening the door for another Lutheran community.

Growing by Leaps and Bounds

Trinity's congregational membership grew rapidly in the early 1900's, reaching a point where the original structure was no longer adequate. In 1912 a loan from the Board of Church Extension was repaid. In that same year the congregation purchased the lot south of the parsonage on Bostwick St., "to be held until such time when it may become necessary to enlarge our church." The Annual Report of 1914 showed that continued growth, with an average Sunday attendance of 375 to 400, had made expansion an inevitability.

At the January Annual Meeting of 1915, a committee was appointed to begin planning for an enlargement of the church. At an evening meeting in June of 1915, slides were shown of changes to the exterior, enlargement of the "auditorium" interior, as the sanctuary was called at that time, and new Sunday School rooms. They carried a total cost estimate of \$25,000.00. By September of 1915, nearly \$22,000.00 had already been pledged, and the congregation voted to proceed. A Building Committee and supporting Advisory Committee were also appointed, under the chairmanship of Mr. George A. Krause. A \$20,000.00 loan was secured from Kent State Bank, and the remodeling began in the Spring of 1916. The parsonage was removed to make room for the lengthened auditorium, basement rooms, and education building. The old pews and pipe organ were sold and replaced, this time with straight pews facing forward which could seat 500.

Perhaps the most memorable addition for those who worshipped there, was the carved reredos behind the altar, containing a carving of Da Vinci's "Last Supper." This art piece remains at Trinity today prominently displayed in our overlook. The expanded church was rededicated on January 7, 1917. Total cost for the additions and remodeling was \$33,166.00.

In celebration of Trinity's fiftieth anniversary in 1946, the congregation elected to build a chapel "as an expression of appreciation to God for the many blessings received in that first half-century." A campaign was begun in 1947 to raise the necessary funds, while plans were drawn by the architectural firm of Daverman & Co. Yet another Building Committee was appointed, this time under the direction of Mr. Henry Walstrom. The June 2, 1949, *Messenger* carried an article about the second fund campaign for the new chapel. One of the justifications in favor of building stated that, "This will probably be the last building project for the congregation. The chapel will give us everything that we shall probably need for our expanding work for many years to come."



The chapel was constructed by general contractor Burt Aalsburg. It ran parallel to the main sanctuary and connected to the narthex by means of a cloistered walkway. Between the two was a sunken garden. Most of the blonde wood furnishings again came from Grand Rapids furniture manufacturers. The Reredos, altar, baptismal font, pews seating 130 people, lectern, and pulpit were all made by the American Seating Company of Grand Rapids. Fifty additional side chairs for the balcony came from Grand Rapids manufacturer Brower Furniture Co. A twenty-five by six-foot greenhouse flanked one side of the chapel and was planted with flowers and shrubs. The cornerstone was laid on September 24, 1950. The Chapel was dedicated on April 22, 1951, and cost \$85,000.00.

A donation was made in 1953, which enabled the congregation to install a carillon in the Chapel tower. The March 26, 1953, *Messenger* announced that the chimes would be rung for the first time on the following Sunday. Members were encouraged to park their cars south or west of the church, and "spend a quiet thirty minutes listening to familiar hymns played on the carillon." After its dedication, Trinity received many letters of appreciation from patients at

nearby Butterworth Hospital, saying that the familiar hymns renewed their faith and courage. **In 1954 the speakers were turned toward the hospital for the patients' benefit, and requests were taken, to be played on the following Sunday.**

Fourteen art glass windows were added to the Chapel in 1955. These windows were incorporated into the current church when it was constructed in 1961. During the ten years that Trinity remained downtown, the chapel was used for all its intended purposes. After Trinity moved to its present site, the chapel remained in use as the Spectrum Theater of Grand Rapids Community College until 1996 when it was scheduled for demolition.

Planning Underway for a Fall Celebration of Trinity's 125th Anniversary

On behalf of the 125th Anniversary Committee, Doug Haneline recently updated the Congregation Council on plans and proposed activities to mark Trinity's 125 years of mission and ministry in the Grand Rapids community. The committee has met several times this spring and summer and has identified the following ideas for celebrating Trinity's 125th:

1. Placing monthly pieces drawn from Chris Carron's 100th anniversary historical booklet into *The Messenger*
2. Interviewing older/lifelong church members to record their memories of our heritage
3. Reaching out to recent former pastors (Krupinski, Cobb, Stobie) for interviews and/or participation in anniversary activities
4. Reaching out to local media to lift up our celebration
5. With the help of retired Director of Discipleship Sylvia Stouten, compiling a record of Trinity's benevolence giving historically
6. Working with volunteer archivists Karen Legault and Mary Minich-Carwell, gathering a record of who we are and have been as a congregation
7. Supplementing Chris Carron's excellent 100th anniversary history with an update for the past quarter century
8. Making use of the Overlook Gallery for displays and exhibits between now and December
9. Planning a musical event/choir concert/festival, in consultation with Trinity Choir Director Sid Hoeksema, nearer to the December 9 date of the congregation's formal organizing in 1896
10. Planning for a "post pandemic" congregational celebration on December 5, the Second Sunday in Advent



In addition to celebration in worship at the services on that day, a celebration of food and fellowship will be available in the Courtyard area throughout the morning.

Doug wrote, "As the committee continues to meet, we generate new ideas and give our plans more substance. Our goal is to mark this important event with reminders of Trinity's past and inspiration for the future. We welcome suggestions from the congregation to maximize the quality of our anniversary celebration."

Let us give thanks for 125 years of ministry and the heritage we share in our time with those who have gone before us!

Remembering the Children

This letter was received throughout our denomination in July of this year, after the devastating discovery of the mass grave at the Kamloops Residential School in Canada. I will be asking the Trinity Congregation Council to consider hanging an orange banner for 225 days beginning in Advent of 2021. –Pastor Bob Linstrom

Greetings in the name of our Creator, in the name of Jesus, Savior of all. We speak to you all today on behalf of the Indigenous people throughout North Americas. We come with sad hearts at the news of 215+ children of the Kamloops Residential School whose remains were recently found in a mass grave and of the children of the Rosebud Sioux whose bodies were returned to their homeland this past week. They are being remembered by many by the color orange.

The color orange is symbolic and came from the inspiration of a survivor of that era, Phyllis Webstad, who stated that when she was a 6-year-old girl arriving at a residential boarding school, she was stripped of her clothes which included a new orange t-shirt her grandmother had gifted her which was never given back. The orange shirt/color now symbolizes how the church and the schools they administered took away the Indigenous identity of the children in their care.

In honor and memory of the children of the First Nations people and of our Native children who never made it home, and for those still living the nightmare imposed on them as children of Canada and the United States we humbly ask our brothers and sisters of the church to hang an orange banner in the sanctuaries of your churches for 225 days. In remembrance and lament of each child that was thrown into those graves, and those yet to be discovered, we honor each of their lives.

Please grieve with us and remember us as the Indigenous people of this land who are going through a very sad and heartbreaking time in our collective psyche. We invite all our Christian brothers and sisters, in solidarity with us, to honor all our First Nations and our Native children that never made it out of residential schools by hanging an orange banner for 225 days.

We now call on the Church to acknowledge and confess its complicity in all the atrocities committed against the Indigenous peoples of North America and throughout the world where western Christianity colonized Indigenous peoples. Please stand in partnership with us for the children.

The true history of the western church in America has been participation in acts of ethnic cleansing, genocide through warfare including biological and chemical, sterilization, depletion of our main food source, the taking of land and resources for personal gains. We ask you, the ELCA Church and Bishops Church leaders and congregations to support our people in remembering the children.

Many Tribal nations have had church groups offer apologies on behalf of their ancestors, which is well and good, but that only serves to assuage any feelings of guilt or shame for them and does not bring about true repentance. So, in light of these past gestures we call upon the churches serving in the United States to advocate the U.S. Government to fully acknowledge all the atrocities it has committed against the indigenous peoples of this land now known as the United States of America and for the future of Christianity in Indian Country.

There is a young student at Martin Luther King, Jr. Leadership Academy in Grand Rapids that needs your help working toward the goal of high school graduation. For 27 years, First United Methodist Church has sponsored the tutoring program at MLK Jr. Leadership Academy.
