“Helping Hands” Coordinator

A part-time staff position, 10 to 15 hours weekly, that seeks to lead our efforts to care well for our congregation’s members through programs and volunteers, including:



- coordination of “Helping Hands” ministry for meals, rides, and other needs of Trinity members
- working with our pastors/staff to coordinate care of homebound members/“Trinity in Touch” visitation ministry
- coordination of altar flower delivery and of Christmas poinsettias to the homebound, grieving, hospitalized, etc.
- assisting with communications to support Trinity’s Prayer Ministry/prayer chain and helping coordinate the Prayer Tree Ministry matching adults and children in prayer relationships
- providing administrative support for outreach with prospective members, including our “Let’s Connect” ministry, and procuring Time and Talent surveys from new members; helping facilitate our activation of members and constituents based on Time and Talent surveys
- helping coordinate “Trinity Neighbors,” an every-member effort at building community within our congregation
- supporting efforts to maintain a Trinity pictorial directory
- developing and supporting a “Helping Hands” Committee to share leadership of this ministry
- providing for communications with the congregation to grow support for “Helping Hands” initiatives

Discipleship & Outreach Coordinator

A part-time staff position, 15 to 20 hours weekly, that seeks to lead our efforts at outreach in the wider community with our benevolent community service partners, coordinating Trinity members to serve through:

- coordinating roughly 65 volunteers, four times annually, for Interfaith Hospitality Network (IHN)
- coordinating efforts to activate volunteers for other community outreach such as Habitat for Humanity builds, serving meals at agencies like Dégagé and God’s Kitchen, supporting Congress Elementary School partnerships, and other volunteer initiatives
- supporting Trinity’s ongoing refugee resettlement efforts
- supporting Trinity’s many financial appeals for local ministries and for churchwide efforts like the World Hunger Appeal and Disaster Response, special offerings during Advent and Lent, etc.
- working with Trinity’s Outreach Committee to provide oversight to our many outreach ministries and to establish and administer our outreach financial support
- supporting other congregational outreach efforts including backpack/school supply appeals, Kids Coalition Against Hunger (KCAH) meal packing, Family Promise and Access fundraisers, LWR quilting, etc.
- helping facilitate our activation of members based on Time and Talent surveys
- providing for communications with the congregation to grow support outreach and discipleship ministries

These are position descriptions that will evolve as candidates interview for and step into these roles in our life together. Please contact [Pastor Linstrom](#) for more information.

A Message from Pastor Bob Linstrom

"Thoughts and Prayers"

Beloved Community,

It seems that whenever there is a mass shooting in our country, our public discourse follows an increasingly familiar pattern. Mass shootings should not happen often enough for a predictable, routine response, but that is not our reality.

The language of "thoughts and prayers" offered by any with at least a semblance of faith grounding has become increasingly contentious. Public officials and faith peoples offer public statements extending prayerful support and sympathy, but the language seems to come from an autopilot response to a world that is out of control. Four years ago, after the shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, I remember the student survivor who decried all of those "thoughts and prayers" as she demanded action to change the mass shooting culture that could allow students going to school to be gunned down. Ever since that time, I have reflected that an offering to hold individuals or communities in my thoughts and prayers might come off as hollow or disingenuous.

It must be said that I do hold sisters and brothers on life's journey in prayer and, in so doing, keep them forefront in my thoughts. But, as Marcus Borg wrote, "Compassion without justice can mean caring for victims while quietly acquiescing to a system that creates even more victims."¹ Somehow, even in the face of daunting political and social challenges, we need to be about the business of seeking change, advocating for a better day and pursuing justice.

Victims and their families do seek compassion and prayer, and people of faith should be about the business of offering those gifts. As Dr. Russell Johnson of the University of Chicago Divinity School wrote, "We don't need a moratorium on prayer to stop school shootings. Thinking and praying can train our moral perception, reorienting our vision to make us more aware of our duties, our failings, our interdependence."²

When our vision is reoriented to make us more aware of "our duties, our failings, our interdependence," we will likely need to progress beyond our postures of prayer to lives active in engagement. Theologian and ethicist Reinhold Niebuhr penned the famed Serenity Prayer 70 years ago: "God, grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, courage to change the things I can, and wisdom to know the difference." Writing in post-World War II American culture, Niebuhr did not have a vision of our nation's problems in the 2020s, but his prayer remains directive. Let us be those who continue to hold one another in thought and prayer but let us also be those who have the courage to advocate for systemic change that can make our world a safer place. May the best of our compassionate hearts be joined with lives seeking the betterment of the world in which we live and love.

It remains a privilege to serve as a pastor among you.

A Message from Council Member Eric Gohlke

"Charlie Mike" is a military phrase that is code for "continue the mission." Those of you who served may be familiar with this phrase that inherently means that no matter the difficulties, one must push through adversity and **continue the mission**, never quitting until the mission is complete. Failure is an option, but quitting is not.

I became very familiar with this phrase, growing up with a grandfather who served in World War I, teaching recruits how to ride and handle horses, and with ten uncles who served in World War II. One of my uncles was a bomber pilot in the Pacific and was one of the first bombers to land outside of Nagasaki, Japan after the bomb had been dropped, delivering medical supplies and personnel to help with the injured. Another uncle fought in the jungles of Burma. My own father fought in Europe and was awarded a Silver Star, a Bronze Star and a Purple Heart for his bravery during combat. The next generation produced two colonels, one of whom was a West Point graduate and lead Black Ops teams out of planes in the middle of the night.

As evidenced by the list above, I am aware of the positions my enlisted relatives held or currently hold, and I know some details about the missions they undertook. However, few details have emerged about what exactly my family members did during live combat. It just wasn't something that they talked about. But one thing is clear: they were willing to sacrifice their time and safety to do something that was largely behind the scenes without expecting recognition in return.

So, what does this have to do with Trinity Lutheran Church?

Just as the enlisted men from my family were and are quiet and humble leaders who have handled various challenges without regard to accolades, praise, or thanks, Trinity Lutheran Church has many who are willing to give their time and to work quietly behind the scenes in many different ways to benefit the church and our community as a whole. They do this work so that the church can continue to do the work of Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. In Chapter 20:28, Matthew writes: "Just as the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." We at Trinity are asked to do the same – to dedicate our lives to serving Jesus and the others that surround us.

There are of course many opportunities within the congregation to serve. Some take more time and commitment while others are small and may only require dedication to a couple of activities during the course of the year. Some of these opportunities aren't even formal things to sign up for and can be as simple as welcoming or acknowledging others you meet with a smile or offering peace and understanding to those around us. Serving makes us healthier and happier and glorifies God.

On this Fourth of July, we remember many who have served in the Armed Forces and who have willingly given of themselves so that others may be free and enjoy a better life. While not all of us have experience in the Armed Forces, we can be inspired by past and current service members by serving others in our church and community in any way we can. As Deuteronomy 15:11 states: "For there will never cease to be poor in the Land. Therefore I command you. You shall open wide your hand to your brother, to the needy and to the poor in your land."

Let us continue to serve others with joyful hearts and peace and understanding.



A Message from Associate Pastor Dan Schewe

"Early Christianity was the most successful treatment plan for the ills of the human soul ever conceived..." –Carl Young



This June the Center for Action and Contemplation (cac.org) started a new season of their podcast entitled *Learning How to See with Brian McLaren*. The previous seasons were filled with wonderfully engaging conversations and teachings, and I am excited to see where this season goes.

In this season's first episode Brian, Diana Butler Bass, and Mike Petrow converse about the question 'How do you see Christianity?'. They talk about how they have experienced the Church and Jesus in a variety of ways in their lives, both positively and negatively. It reminded me of many of my own experiences and those that have been shared with me. Some beautiful and some filled with pain.

Pause for a moment and think about how you have seen and experienced the church, God, and Christianity? How do these experiences shape your view of God?

During the podcast conversation, Mike talks about how Origen, an early Christian scholar and theologian, has shaped his vision of Christianity and how this particular view drew him back in. He references the above Carl Young quote, and I think it is a quote and idea worth holding on to; that at its core Christianity is about treating the ills of the human soul. This is what draws so many to the church. We all know the hurt that lives inside of us and surrounds us daily, and at its core the church seeks to help find a way to mend these wounds and restore our connections to each other and to God.

Sadly, Young's quote does not end there. He goes on to say, "but then [Christianity] was inherited by empire and reinterpreted, and then the empire collapsed, and it was inherited by a bunch of warring tribes and reinterpreted as feudalism." In other words, at its core the church is about healing the ills of the human soul, but over the years it has been reinterpreted into a lot of other things. Sadly, many of these reinterpretations have led to a lot of pain, and that pain has shaped how many view the church and God.

This summer I hope you join me in contemplating how we have seen and experienced God, and how others have seen and experienced God through us. May we not lose sight of the plot of Christianity or confuse it with another, different agenda. May we be a people who are about healing the ills of the human soul.



Music Ministries

ALL CREATION SINGS: A New Resource for ELCA Worship Music

You may have noticed that there are now two song books in the pews of Trinity Lutheran Church. The red hymnal, *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, continues to be incorporated in liturgy and song choices for worship at the 8 and 10:45 a.m. traditional worship services, but now there is a new, purple book titled *All Creation Sings* alongside the red hymnal.

In 2020, Augsburg Fortress published this new resource for congregational singing. It offers 200 additional songs for worship as well as two new settings of the sung liturgy. With the blessing of the Worship and Music Committee, this new resource was purchased and arrived in the sanctuary in mid-May 2022.

We are glad to have this resource to expand the options for congregational singing on a weekly basis. As the introduction to the supplement states, "All Creation Sings evokes a recurring scriptural theme. Psalm 96 is an example in which the sky, the earth, the sea, the field, and the forest are invited into sung rejoicing at God's coming."

May the advent of this new collection of sacred music be an offering to God as we raise our voices together in worship.

Stephen Ministry



The Biblical Basis of Stephen Ministry

Stephen Ministry is a Christian educational organization founded by Lutheran Pastor Kenneth Haugk in 1975. It takes its mission statement from Ephesians 4. The mission of Stephen Ministry is:

"...to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ." —Ephesians 4:12-13



The name "Stephen" comes from St. Stephen, who was the first layperson commissioned by the apostles to provide caring ministry to those in need (Acts 6). Since the time of the apostles, caring ministry has been considered a hallmark of the Christian faith community.

Trinity has embraced Stephen Ministry to help carry out our congregation's mission, "to nurture each other in our daily journeys of faith and to joyfully increase our response to all people in need, sharing God's gifts of love and grace." The training programs developed by Stephen Ministry in St. Louis have been invaluable in equipping volunteers here at Trinity for their caring ministries. Stephen Ministers are trained volunteers who seek to live the command to "Bear one another's burdens, and in this way, you will fulfill the law of Christ" (Galatians 6:2), and who trust in the promise that "For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them" (Matthew 18:20).



Trinity's Overlook Gallery to Feature the Works of Artist Mary Reusch

Be sure to stop by Trinity's Overlook Gallery during the months of July and August to view the works of local artist Mary Reusch.

From Mary's blog:

Painting landscapes gives me the opportunity to go out into nature and observe it very closely. Standing in a meadow, or in a forest, or on the shore of a lake gives me a chance to soak up the essence of the land and enjoy its rhythms. Capturing these many scenes is a time-honored vision. As civilization has encroached on the landscape, artists have been working hard to preserve the memory of wild areas. One such group were the Barbizon painters from 19th century France, who first felt the impact of industrialization. Painters like Rousseau and Millet strove to monumentalize everyday life and their surroundings, bringing in new honesty and soul to the world of painting. These ideas were echoed a few years later here in the United States by artists such as George Inness as he endeavored to give his landscapes a sense of the divine. My own connection to the natural world causes me to want to capture what I observe and experience. As our current wilderness continues to disappear right here in West Michigan, and we spread out and build more and more, I find that what we have left is increasingly sacred in my eyes.
